ANNUAL REPORT 2018



Housing insecurity, not having enough money to feed the kids or pay an unexpected bill, the impact of family violence and historical trauma, is the lived experience of too many people in our community. Making a difference in these situations and bringing hope is what we are about, working together to live life well to support people to effect a change for good. Primarily our focus is on the families. We support parents to provide loving caring environments for kids to grow up in, but individuals, couples and communities also access our help. In 2018 we continued to offer our core services of counselling for individuals and couples and social / community work in Dunedin and Central Otago to meet the needs of these communities, but we also made a few changes to what services we delivered and added some new ones which are highlighted in this report. I want to thank all who support this work through finance, prayer and your words of encouragement. Together we can live life well.

In 2018 Catholic Social Services began work with 847 new clients in the following ways



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Responding to the needs

Best Start

Building on 30 years of success in Birth Support Group (an antenatal group for young mums to be), we have invested in more social work hours and a new way of working (with the financial support of Mercy Hospital) so that the most vulnerable mums might receive a greater level of antenatal care in order to address many more of the complexities in their lives that may impact negatively on their children. This change has seen more women engage in the service and a corresponding better outcome for the children. Under Best Start, we have also been able to work with the dads and partners, and have included our play groups, ABC for mums and Play On! for dads as part of the support for families with children up to 3 years old.

Supervised Contact

The families we see in this Service are often going through difficult situations and while this is being worked out, we provide a safe and supportive environment for children to enjoy time with their parents. Recently we have provided a space for a Mum to spend important time with her son twice a week. Together they played with the toys and enjoyed different activities with lots of laughs and cuddles. Things progressed well and its wasn't long before it was decided that we were no longer needed and everything would be ok to return to normal.

Not all situations end like this but we have a great team committed to make the time the kids have, the best it can be, despite the obvious challenges.

South Dunedin Community Network

Growing out of our active involvement in South D, we joined a conversation with others working and living in the area keen to see more happen for this community. With important issues like climate change, increased cost of housing, and the impacts of poverty and exclusion being keenly felt in this community, it was felt that now is the time to do something. So towards the end of 2018 a small group formed and set up the South Dunedin Community Network with Catholic Social Services providing management oversight. Now with two staff working out of CSS offices, community consultations, hui and negotiations with the Dunedin City Council we are all looking for shared solutions that can be developed that will ensure that South Dunedin is a great place to work, live and play.



So are people now living life well?


